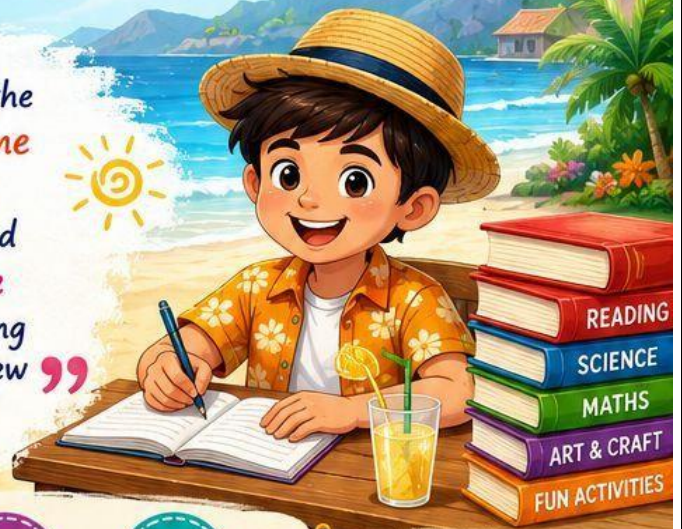

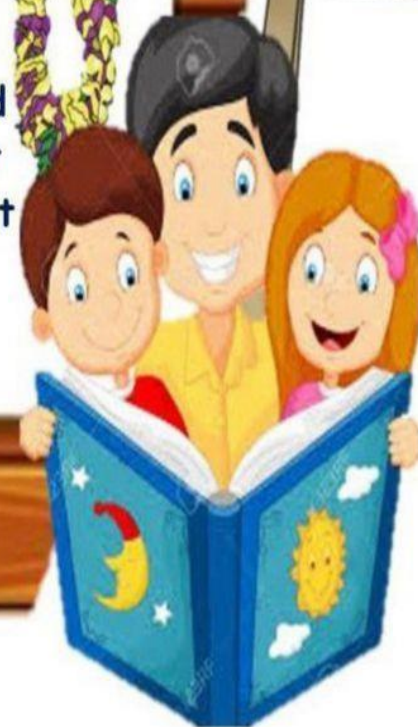
Summer Holiday
